Report: Alleged pot dealer supplied KU basketball players

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — A Kansas man at the center of large-scale marijuana use allegedly supplied the drug to multiple players from the 2010-11 Kansas men's basketball team, a federal prosecutor said.

The Kansas City Star reported Friday that an assistant U.S. attorney made the claim during a June 18 detention hearing for Samuel Villeareal III.

The 32-year-old from Houston received the rights to the Clippers' 53rd overall pick, Furkan Aldemir, and the Jazz sent the team's trade exception to Dallas. The Mavs also received cash considerations from Houston.

Williams must pass a physical but is expected to hold a news conference in Salt Lake City on Monday or Tuesday.

The Jazz drafted Williams in 2003 but allowed him to leave after one season, a decision that general manager Kevin O'Connor said was the worst he ever made.

Cancer has hit my family. Uncle Charlie died from skin cancer in 1992 at age 33. One of my grandpas died from pancreatic cancer. The other had a form of

leukemia that took his life.

But my story isn't unique either. Tonight isn't about me, Marc Blackim or even baseball. "This is about life," Blackim said. "That's what this is about. It's our little, small way to help people fight the good fight."

Let's see what tonight could mean in terms of dollars.

If 500 people drop off a \$5 bill on their way through the gate, that would be \$2,500.

There are 27 players listed on the Monarchs roster, plus three coaches. That's 30 jerseys, plus Blackim will sport one of the unique pink-on-black shirts.

If the average jersey goes for \$50 — which is likely a conservative number — that's another \$1,550.

Not counting the com-

memorative t-shirts that will be sold during the game, the Monarchs can expect to raise at least \$4,000 tonight. Everyone who buys a t-shirt, wins a jersey or drops off a donation will likely be someone directly affected by cancer.

It's a big night for the Monarchs and their fans. Everyone will be treated to quality baseball, a kabooming fireworks show after the game, and the fun that comes with silent auctions.

It's all going to a great cause, because cancer sucks and deserves to be destroyed. Everyone who goes to the game can be a small part of that fight.
